Hi, my name is Rebecca Nachiappan. I'm currently working as a locum senior house officer in A&E in England. I will also be starting histopathology training in August 2025. In this report, I will be writing about my experience with the Ghent Pathology 2025 congress.

# Why did you want to go to the Joint Meeting?

I'd recently realised that aside from the RCPath International Pathology Day, I've not attended many pathology-specific conferences. I wanted to gain more exposure to the field in preparation to starting as an ST1 in August, as well as learn about any recent and upcoming advancements in the field.

I also wanted to mingle with other aspiring and current pathologists. I have done histopathology taster weeks and electives, but wanted to take this opportunity to network with pathologists involved in active research and clinical academics.

# Do you feel more confident in your clinical practice following attendance at the Joint Meeting?

Absolutely! I really enjoyed the undergraduate symposium. My undergrad years are a fair few years behind me at this point, but I wanted to learn a bit more about the job itself before I start in August.

I've already got an idea on what will be expected from me as an ST1, but Dr Matthew Clarke's talk about his career journey as a histopathologist was truly enlightening. He answered a few questions I had on the exams in the early stages of training.

I learnt about the career path of pathology trainees who followed the 'traditional' academic clinical fellow path as well as those who took OOPR (out-of-programme research) instead to pursue research. The latter is something I might consider for myself.

# Highlight aspects of what you have learnt from the Joint Meeting which you were not aware of prior to the day.

Thanks to Dr Thomas Butters' talk in the undergraduate symposium, I learnt that you can still pursue a career in clinical academia despite not securing an academic clinical fellow post. Dr Butters talked about how he secured research grants and took OOPR time during his training.

I was also uncertain about whether the OSPE examination is still something that is routinely done in ST1. Dr Clarke explained that it was a requirement a few years ago, but it's not routinely done now.

### Are there any aspects of what you have learnt during the Joint Meeting that you would consider incorporating into your own practice or have already incorporated into practice?

I absolutely lapped up the oral presentations on machine learning and 3D modelling from pathology slides. I will be keeping up-to-date with advancements in digital and computational pathology alongside pursuing my Msc in bioinformatics.

# Did the Joint Meeting meet your expectations?

It exceeded my expectations! I thoroughly enjoyed the undergraduate oral presentations in particular. I felt so proud of our current medical students and the contributions they've already made to clinical research.

# Finally, would you recommend it to your colleagues?

100% yes. The conference was intellectually stimulating and very enjoyable. I would definitely attend a similar one again, and would recommend it to anyone I know.
