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Thank you to the British Division of the International Academy of Pathology! With your generous financial support, I was able to attend the Leeds Pathology meeting in Harrogate. I had a wonderful time in Harrogate.

Starting 7.20am with the registration on the first day, my colleague and I woke up round 6am to prepare breakfast. Our accommodation was approximately 0.7 miles away from the Harrogate Conference Centre, so we were able to walk to the Conference Centre. The conference consisted of symposia, workshops, and lectures. Furthermore, there were also 'poster sessions' during the breaks with official poster rounds.

While attending the trainee workshop on the final day, the chair suddenly announced that the poster prize winners were present in the audience. To my great pleasure, I won the third poster prize of the BDIAP and felt very honoured by this.

Being able to attend this well-organized conference with world-class and very enthusiastic speakers, allowed me to learn a lot with respect to diagnostic histopathology, but also got some new ideas for next research projects. In particular, I found the following lectures outstanding: '100.000 Genomes project and cancer', 'Colorectal cancer biomarkers: from molecular modelling to immunohistochemistry', and 'IgG4-related disease in the pancreatobiliary system: how good is histopathology as the gold standard of diagnosis?'

This was my very first time visit to the UK and to Harrogate, so I also tried to see a little bit of the city and enjoyed the opportunity to network with international trainees and pathologists at the social events organised by the conference. Starting at the first day with the welcome reception at the Sun Pavilion, then the lovely oldest pub in town, Hale Bar, and not to forget the 'Spaced' band performing live during the conference dinner at the Royal Hall. I extended my stay until the weekend and went to taste the famous Bettys' coffee, tea and cake. "Congratulations to Bettys with your 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary!".
